NAIMUN 2022 — SIMUN's first National Championship

It was impossible to ignore the energy in the room... *You could feel it.*

More than one thousand students from schools across Illinois and beyond packed the Gentile '42 Gym for the largest one-day high school Model United Nations conference in the country.

As members of the Saint Ignatius College Prep team hosted SIMUN XXIII, Ms. Diane Haleas, their program director, sat in the front row taking it all in with a smile. It was almost as if she was thinking what she later gave voice to during an interview for this article:

"I just love the kids. I really do. It feels very fulfilling."

The club she has led with passion and dedication for 25 years, has come a long way since its Wolfpack rebirth in 1999. Around that time, two Ignatius students who went to Georgetown University for a summer program, returned with the idea to restart Model UN at 1076 West Roosevelt Road.

The students who were on a mission to bring the club back, spoke with Ms. Haleas about it because she teaches comparative politics. Soon, they were off and running. Seven students got on board to research, explore and confront a range of global issues. Under Ms. Haleas' guidance, that small group of students – like all the young men and women who would follow in their footsteps – dove into diplomacy and discovered the real challenges and rewards of international relations.

Reflecting on those early days, Ms. Haleas said, "I knew 'zero' when I started this. I was excited by the students' excitement, and it was my area of teaching, but I had no vision in the beginning because I didn't know anything about it. SIMUN evolved over time because of the students. They wanted to take it to new levels, and I supported it."

In the spirit of the Magis, SIMUN and Ms. Haleas took on more and more with the help of benefactors. The Mel Jiganti '50 Model UN Endowment fueled transformative growth. Donations from people like Stephen and Lisa Rigsbee, whose son Henry '15 was in SIMUN, have made a huge difference too. As a result, local conferences gave way to domestic travel for competition, which led to international Model UN journeys to places like China and Russia. The latter trip had profound meaning for Ms. Haleas. "Growing up a child of the Cold War, I really wanted to understand the diplomatic difficulties as a girl," she said, "Then standing in Red Square as an adult, I cried because that's something I never expected to experience as a child."

Did you know...

Saint Ignatius College Prep President John Chandler was the first person to introduce Model UN to the Wolfpack? "My interest in international affairs and world issues had a lot to do with it," said Mr. Chandler, "This was a time period in our curriculum that we were globally focused in our social studies department."



His stand-out memory in his four years as moderator was the New York city conference that included time at the United Nations. He said, "A diverse group of city kids who had never left Chicago came together on an international platform in New York." The group covered a lot of ground while they were there, learning about their assigned countries and how to interact with young people from different backgrounds. Mr. Chandler says the highlight of the country assignments "was Saint Ignatius representing the former Soviet Union."



Tom Egan '79, who was among the club's student pioneers, remembers it well. "It was one of the most exciting weeks of my life. For a 17-year-old kid from the South Side of Chicago to go to Manhattan, was an amazing experience."

Saint Ignatius College Prep Assistant Prefect of Studies, Maura Maloney '80, who was the first woman to graduate



from Saint Ignatius, also attended one of those early conferences. "What was a very small club with a one-trip component, has evolved into a pivotal program. I always think it's more like a class," she continued, asking, "Where else do we get a group of kids to do more research and write more papers?"

SIMUN's "founding father" is happy to see how far the club has come, especially considering it disappeared for a while. After Mr. Chandler's time as moderator ended, SIMUN went into a kind of hibernation for myriad reasons, but it came roaring back under Ms. Haleas' leadership. "It's a great equalizer for our school community, no matter where you're from or your resources," said Mr. Chandler, who observed, "Ms. Haleas has done an extraordinary job. I cannot think of any other school that has had that continuity of leadership with a person who brings the joy to it that she does."

He says the generous outside support is also key. Mr. Chandler credits Jack Jiganti '58 and his wife Dorothy with establishing the Mel Jiganti '50 Endowment to support students who might not have the financial means, but who have ample passion and an interest in learning about Model UN diplomacy. Bottom line: the endowment has made SIMUN a reality for many students.

The teacher isn't the only one who's had incredible experiences thanks to Model UN. Every conference, near or far, is a growth opportunity for the club's current 150 members. As they take positions for the countries they represent, they develop a range of skills—from researching and writing, to public speaking, problem-solving, negotiation, debate and critical thought.

"On an even deeper level, in the way she manages the team, Ms. Haleas fosters family," said Evan Mehta '25. The Crisis Director for SIMUN XXIII took time to explain how Ms. Haleas makes sure they always know that in their individual SIMUN endeavors, they're contributing to the greater group. He said, "Here, everyone is always looking to help someone else...It's not about what award you take home. It's about what award you help your team take home." That ethos guides the students to work with and support each other – and to bring up the ranks. Seniors routinely mentor the newest SIMUN members.

"It's so much different now," said Ms. Haleas, "We know what we're doing. It's become a machine. We have a system in place for developing kids, getting kids excited and building a supportive environment." The tone she sets - and everyone's commitment to it - has its rewards. Since 1999, SIMUN has brought home more than 60 "Best Large Delegation Awards." The team won its first national championship in 2022 - one of Ms. Haleas' favorite memories. "They were the Covid kids who stuck out three-day competitions online. When they were able to start coming back in person," she said, "they really formed a bond...and to see them reach that goal, it brought such joy."

This year's Secretary General, Sasha Eckler '25, says she's proud to be part of the "esprit de corps" culture Ms. Haleas has created. When she was new to SIMUN, Sasha received an award for being the best in her committee at a conference competition. She said, "I just remember walking back to the team. I didn't care about the gavel I was carrying in my hand (gavels go to the best delegate in a committee). What I really noticed was the seniors who helped me along the way. They stood up from their seats and were cheering, and THAT was amazing."

Even better: Sasha says the very busy Ms. Haleas took time to create congratulatory posters for her, which she kept and treasures. She also recently had a full-circle moment with the team when two of the freshmen she mentored gaveled their own committees.



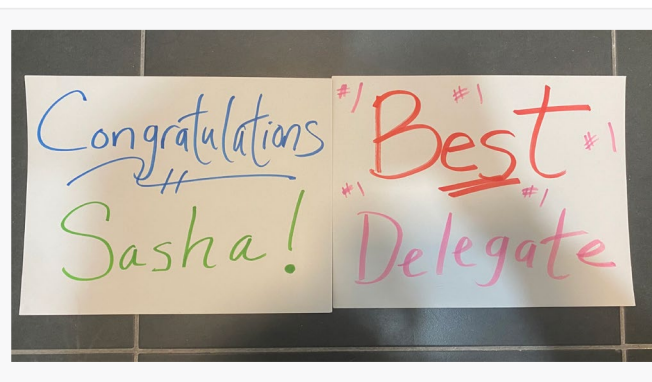

The senior student said, “Ms. Haleas has really changed my life. I’ve realized what it means to be on a team. She has shown me that leadership...is about serving other people and fostering a welcoming environment that allows everyone to succeed.”

Along the way, SIMUN students build lifelong bonds. Evan says volunteering for Ms. Haleas’ middle school Model UN summer camps (PACKMUN) has helped him find some of his best friends. “Whether it’s the daily kickball tournaments we hold during lunches...or the different clothing themes for each day...the camps have been a highlight of my summers,” he said.

SIMUN alumni take it even further. Adam Akan ’22, who was Secretary General his senior year when SIMUN brought home a national championship, and who recently restarted the Model UN team at the University of Notre Dame, said, “SIMUN illuminated for me the direction I wanted to go in life. The experiences I had... motivated me to pick up my political science/global affairs double major at Notre Dame, and helped kindle my love for policymaking and international affairs...The team showed me how interested I am in the process of crafting policy and affecting change through government, and I am excited to do so once I graduate.” Furthermore, Mr. Akan says what he learned from Ms. Haleas’ teaching and training helped him seed, grow and lead his team at The University of Notre Dame.

He’s not the only one who’s spread the good SIMUN word. Peter Haleas ’10, who, like two of his siblings, served on their mom’s team, has started a Model UN program at Chicago’s Cristo Rey Jesuit High School where he teaches English. SIMUN XXIII was their first-ever competition. “My mom introduced me to it,” he said, “and now I’ve introduced it to Cristo Rey. It fits like a glove, elevating what my students realize they can do and who they can be. It gives them the skills to seize more and dream more.” He says he “proudly carries the torch,” and that he’s been inspired “by my mom for a very long time.”

Her son’s work is a point of pride for Ms. Haleas. She says it’s just one of the things that shows her time with SIMUN has been well-spent. “I had to make some sacrifices for all this...all the travel, being away from my family, but I do believe it was worth it to see so many of these young people become leaders and do great things.”

The positive domino effect is one reason Ms. Haleas helps other programs get off the ground and offers advice rooted in her 25 years of experience. She pays it forward because she knows she hasn’t gone it alone. She says she’s grateful people see value in the club and support it with the Jiganti Endowment and another in her name that advances SIMUN.

She's also thankful for the people who've contributed their time over the years, including trip chaperones. Their involvement sparks team evolution. For example, Fr. Patrick Mugisho, S.J. introduced a spiritual component that Ms. Haleas says has fostered the community-building she values so much.

"I needed a chaperone, and Fr. Mugisho responded. He was new to the school. I didn't know him. He showed up at the airport, and I'm like 'Who's this guy?' He got excited about SIMUN, and was really interested in the kids. He suggested a prayer service, and the students loved it," she said. Midnight Masses after conference sessions have become a beloved tradition.

They also say something about who we are. We call on our students to be open to growth, intellectually competent, loving, committed to social justice and religious. Ms. Haleas sees all of that in SIMUN. "It teaches how to be involved, engaged, informed, kind and open...It's a way to put all those Grad at Grad values into action," said Haleas. On a more micro level, she hopes she's teaching her students the value of being committed to something and being committed to other people. "I hope our students get a better understanding of themselves... other perspectives, global issues, global awareness and a growth mindset," she said. "It's about a willingness to listen and engage – not to withdraw, but to be involved. What you have to say matters, and what other people have to say matters, too." ●



A total game-changer.

That's how Jiore Craig '09 describes her Saint Ignatius Model United Nations experience.

"Whenever people ask me how I got to be where I am, I always tell them I had a teacher who pulled me aside and encouraged me to join Model UN. I have been lucky enough to have a successful career, and all of it comes back to what Ms. Haleas and Model UN instilled in me."

Her resume is certainly impressive. Ms. Craig advises public figures, heads of state and politicians. She runs her own consultancy - the Duke and Duchess of Sussex, Prince Harry and Megan Markle, are among her clients. She's worked in Eastern European countries including Moldova and Ukraine and is a senior resident fellow at the Institute for Strategic Dialogue based in London, Berlin and Washington, D.C. Ms. Craig also dedicates her time to child online safety and the fight against state-backed disinformation (with an analytical eye on how the current info ecosystem is eroding trust in democracy).

Like current student Sasha Eckler '25, Ms. Craig was the SIMUN Secretary General her senior year. If you look at her post high school trajectory, the future looks bright for today's Model Un students. She says, "It's really teaching kids how to think critically and experience the world through a global lens." Ms. Craig credits Model UN with challenging young people to know their facts, think on their feet, establish common ground, build consensus and influence others.

She's found a practical application for that range of skills in her real life pursuits, and it all goes back to that moment Ms. Haleas suggested she join SIMUN. So you can understand why, with every major achievement, Ms. Craig says "I text Ms. Haleas."

SIMUN will get a chance to speak and listen on another big diplomatic stage in February. The team is currently preparing for the North American International Model United Nations conference (NAIMUN) at Georgetown University.

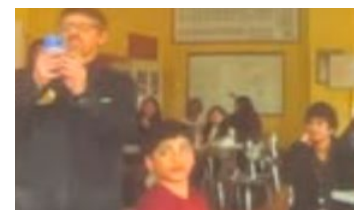

World Classrooms

Saint Ignatius College Prep students enrolled in AP Environmental Science embarked on an enriching off-campus learning adventure this past fall. Their field trip served as a culminating experience for a project focused on urban development and its ecological implications. The students were given the opportunity to visit "The Invert," an innovative subterranean project currently under development on Chicago's Southeast side. This project aims to revitalize the area by transforming the former site of a historic steel mill.

Following their visit to The Invert, the students traveled to Ozinga Concrete to gain firsthand knowledge of concrete production. There, they toured the company's research and development facility and learned about sustainable manufacturing practices aimed at reducing concrete's carbon footprint. The trip provided invaluable practical insights to complement their classroom learning. According to teacher Chris Marks, the experience was "a ton of fun" and highly engaging for the students. These unique field trips not only enhanced their understanding of environmental science concepts but also provided students with real-world examples of sustainable solutions and urban renewal efforts.



Learning About Vocations

Figure Drawing Bootcamp

Ms. Steffen's Studio Drawing classes recently concluded an intensive "Figure Drawing Bootcamp," a focused unit designed to translate theoretical knowledge of human anatomy into practical application. Students engaged in dynamic exercises utilizing live models and creating gesture drawings with oil pastels and pencils. The Bootcamp's primary objective was to develop the ability to quickly and accurately capture the underlying structure and proportions of the human form.

Through a series of timed poses, ranging from rapid ten-second sketches to more extended twenty-minute drawings, students honed their skills in capturing the essence of the human figure. This process not only enhanced their drawing abilities but also provided valuable insights into the role of an artist's model and the importance of proper studio etiquette. Students alternated between being the artist and the model, fostering a deeper understanding and respect for both roles. This immersive experience served as a foundational lead-in to a field trip at the Field Museum of Chicago. There, students had the unique opportunity to meet with the museum's artist-in-residence and further refine their gesture drawing skills within the inspiring context of the museum's exhibits.

The event successfully immersed the young attendees.



The Wolfpack Are Cross-Country State Champs!

The girls cross country team made program and state history by winning the IHSA 2A State Championship at Detweiller Park in Peoria, IL. Winning its very first IHSA state championship with an overall team score of 76, the Wolfpack won in a dominant performance, defeating second-place DePaul College Prep by 101 points, and third-place Chatham by 141 points. The win was the largest margin of victory (boys and girls) for any of the IHSA State Championship meets this season. The Wolfpack also became the very first Chicago-based high school to win an IHSA girls cross country state championship, in any classification, in state history. The Pack was led by Annika Swan '26 (16:27.80), who finished second overall, along with Allison Shutler '28 (9th, 17:13.85) and Greta Sheaffer '28 (23rd, 17:46.21), who each received individual medals for finishing in the top-25. Lizeth Montes '25, Rory Steinhofer '28, Olivia Brophy '28 and Elle Sheaffer '27 also contributed to the state championship-winning performance.



This past fall, the Wolfpack also secured two cross-country conference championships at Loyola Academy's Munz Campus in Glenview. Girls Cross Country secured its second straight Girls Catholic Athletic Conference Championship and thirteenth overall in program history. Annika Swan '26 won her third consecutive individual title leading the Wolfpack to the championship. Ally Shutler '28, Greta Sheaffer '28, Lizeth Montes '25, Rory Steinhofer '28 and Elle Sheaffer '27 joined Swan on the All-GCAC team. Montes '25 achieved a rare distinction by earning All-GCAC honors during all four years. In the Open race, Julieta Mayorga '25 (1st) and Isabella Soriano '25 (2nd) led a group of eight top-20 finishers for the Wolfpack.

Boys Cross Country also secured the Chicago Catholic League Championship, its second league title in the past three seasons and twelfth overall in program history. Ethan Petrillo '26, Manny Alvarez '25, Nick Lopez '25, Brendan Houlihan '27 and Hugh Lynch '25 each received All-CCL honors leading the Wolfpack to the championship. In the open race, Alexander Kepler '26, Aidan Tansor '26 and Alexander Wright '25 led a group of six top-10 finishers for the Wolfpack.

BOYS GOLF won their 14th IHSA Regional Championship this fall by ten strokes over Payton 312-322. The Pack was led by Jake Forrest '25 who shot the low round of the tournament with a 75 as the medalist. Jimmy Doherty '25 was a close second with a round of 76.

GIRLS GOLF won their 5th IHSA Regional title in program history this fall at Cog Hill. The Pack narrowly escaped with the one-stroke win over the Friars of Fenwick 353-354 to grab some hardware. Maggie Helms '25 led the Pack with a round of 84. The team was represented at the IHSA State Finals by individual qualifier Maggie Helms '25 who placed 47th overall. This was the highest state finish for any girls golfer in the past decade.

An Extra Special Feast Day Celebration!

The Feast Day of St. Ignatius of Loyola is always special, but July 31, 2024 was extra special.



Our community came together at Mass at the Church of the Holy Family. Parents and school leaders filled the pews, along with some members of the Saint Ignatius College Prep Class of 2027. They joined in the celebration after fulfilling a day of service at the Greater Chicago Food Depository. The inspiration for their work that day was St. Ignatius of Loyola's famous quote, "Love is shown more in deeds than in words."

After Mass, Fr. Lukas Laniauskas, S.J., who had served as the Vice President for Mission Integration at Saint Ignatius College Prep and who currently serves on the school's Board of Trustees, led the crowd to the school's quad for the unveiling of a project that had been years in the making. During the Covid pandemic, Saint Ignatius President John Chandler, asked Fr. Laniauskas to partner with him in creating a statue to commemorate the Ignatius 500. Father recalls Mr. Chandler saying, "What would it look like for us to design something that could encapsulate that which is the mission that is entrusted to Saint Ignatius College Prep?"

Fr. Laniauskas continued his story for the assembled audience. He talked about how they began to "put together a vision of what Saint Ignatius could look like... and how the statue could serve as a reminder to every student and alum and benefactor...of the person whose name the school bears."

What follows is a point-by-point explanation of the work of art in the quad:

- At the statue's feet, you see a helmet and a sword. Both point to St. Ignatius' former way of life as a knight who ultimately became a servant and saint of God.

- As you study the statue, you see that his right foot is stepping forward and his back, left foot is firmly planted on the ground, symbolizing St. Ignatius was grounded in the faith and in Christ, Jesus. At the same time, he steps forward into mission to serve the world so desperately in need.
- The traditional Jesuit cassock represented on the statue has meaning, too. It's flowing in the wind in a Baroque style. St. Ignatius lived during the Baroque period of art, and so his cassock symbolizes the drama of that time. Fr. Laniauskas explained, "The Protestant Reformation was raging, Europe discovered America in 1492 and Ignatius was born in 1491. The change in the world was significant and dramatic, symbolized in his cassock."
- In the statue representation, St. Ignatius holds a banner or standard that reads, "Ad Majorem Dei Gloriam," which translates, "All for the greater glory of God." Fr. Laniauskas says this is meant to show Ignatius is not lost in the world. He points to his heart, and three letters: IHS, for the name of Jesus. The statue's upward gaze is squarely on the cross that graces the bell tower of the church. That is the direction St. Ignatius always points: to the cross; to Jesus; to the person he serves and the mission that is before him.

- Finally, the three tears you see on St. Ignatius' face represent the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit.

After blessing the statue, and inviting people to do the same, Fr. Laniauskas made sure to also convey the meaning of its placement. The four benches and lights around St. Ignatius are for our freshmen, sophomores, juniors and seniors. "They are now given the light, and after their education," explained the Jesuit priest, "they take the light to bring into the world, having received it here."

It is the manifestation in art of that phrase you see and hear on our beloved campus: *Ite Inflammate Omnia*. Go out and set the world on fire.



A Soldier Comes Home

The body of a deceased World War II soldier has been identified as Jeremiah Patrick Mahoney, who had ties to 1076 West Roosevelt Road. From 1939 to 1941, he was a student at what was then called St. Ignatius High School.

Mahoney was born to an Irish Catholic family in Chicago in 1925 and grew up in Englewood. He attended Visitation Grammar School and enrolled at St. Ignatius High School in 1939.

Mahoney would have graduated with the class of 1943, but withdrew from school on December 17, 1941 - ten days after Pearl Harbor.



Mahoney enlisted in the U.S. Army and was sent to Europe to serve in an Anti-Tank Company. He was stationed in Northeastern France when German forces launched a major counteroffensive in late December of 1944.

Jeremiah Mahoney was killed in fighting sometime on January 17, 1945. The

intensity of the fighting necessitated an evacuation from the area and his unit was unable to recover his remains. Mahoney was just nineteen years old when he died.

In 1947, the American Graves Registration Command discovered a soldier's remains in the forest near Reipertswiller, France,

but were unable to identify the soldier. The Unknown was buried at Ardennes American Cemetery in Belgium in 1949.

In 2022, the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency exhumed the soldier's remains and transferred them to a laboratory for DNA testing. This spring, they confirmed that the fallen soldier was Jeremiah Patrick Mahoney of Chicago, Illinois. He will be buried at Arlington National Cemetery on a date to be determined later.

On Veteran's Day and every day, Saint Ignatius College Prep is proud to commemorate the sacrifice of Jeremiah Mahoney and each member of our community who has given so much - in Private Mahoney's case, everything - in the defense of this country.

A Person for Others: Dr. John C. Wall - Class of 1924

On the 100th anniversary of his graduation from Saint Ignatius, it is fitting and appropriate that we recognize Dr. John C. Wall who truly lived his life in the service of others as the Jesuit motto calls us to do. He was a family doctor on the South Side of Chicago, practicing old-school, full-service health care that is no longer practiced. In addition to his service as a doctor, John and his wife, Geraldine, were parents to nine children.



John didn't just serve his community in Chicago, he also served his country during World War II. The 38-year-old father of nine, who survived polio was called to duty. He served in Manchester, England for two years caring for wounded soldiers. Doctors back then were not only internists but also surgeons. Regrettably, those he helped heal were usually sent right back to the front lines. Such is life in a world war.

Although none of his children attended Saint Ignatius, John's younger brothers, two sons-in-law, and scores of grandchildren and great-grandchildren, nieces and nephews have attended Saint Ignatius including current freshman, Elizabeth Wall '28.

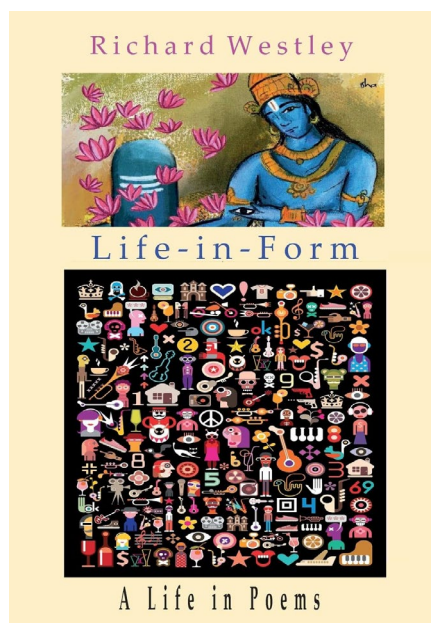
Ripecky '10 Named COO

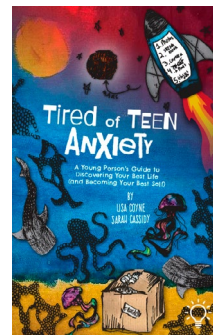

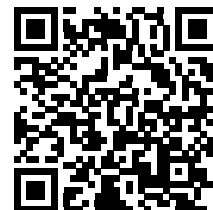

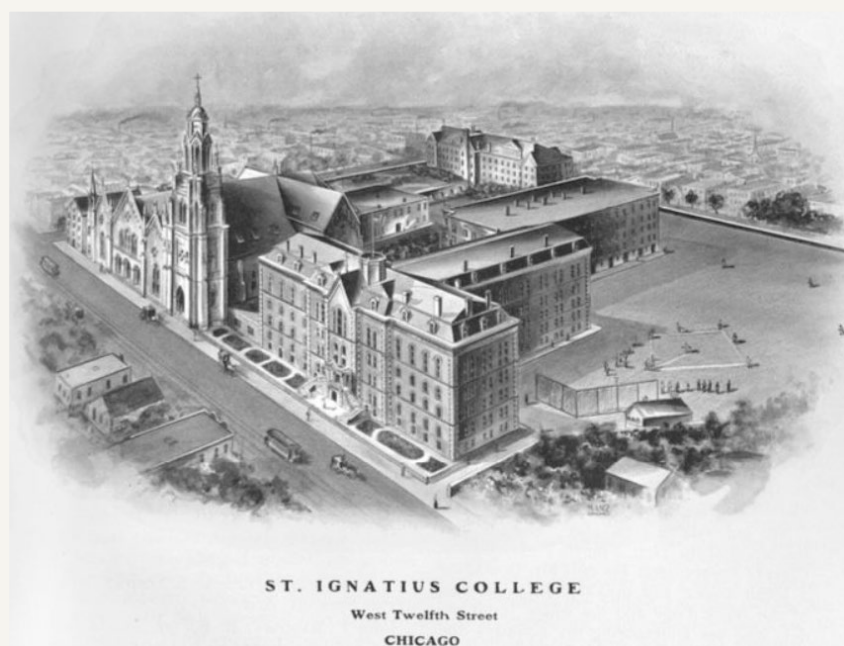

Sodality Hall

A Story of the Past and a Vision for the Future

Asodality is, in essence, a community. Sodality derives from the Latin *sodalitas*, or companion, and means an organization of Catholics who gather to hone their faith and community. The first Sodality Hall stood next to St. Ignatius College from 1878 to 1960 and housed the sodalities of Church of the Holy Family and St. Ignatius College. For many of the immigrant families arriving in Chicago in the late nineteenth century, Sodality Hall was more than just a building - it was a place of companionship, learning and faith that was a vital pillar of their community.

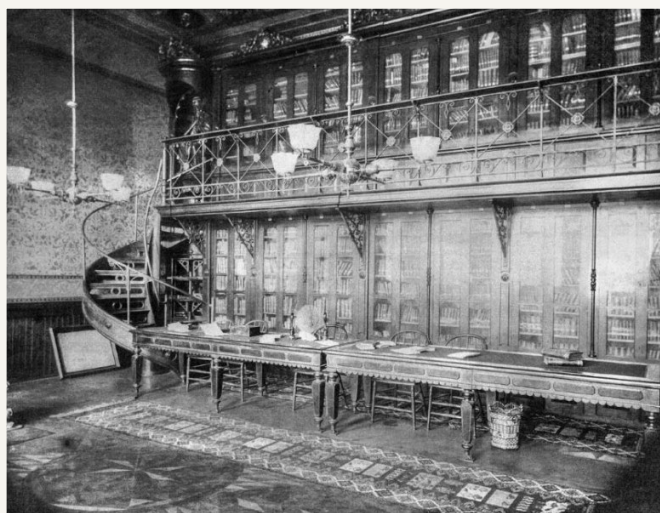
The original Sodality Hall began to take shape on a September morning in 1878 when several thousand Chicago Catholics marched from Saint Patrick's Church to Church of the Holy Family to lay the cornerstone for the building. Bishop Thomas Foley was

the leader of the procession from Old St. Pat's. His generosity to the Jesuits was immense - he had donated \$1,000 toward a Natural History Museum in 1874 to thank Fr. Arnold Damen, S.J. for welcoming him into St. Ignatius College and allowing him to use the offices during the Great Chicago Fire.

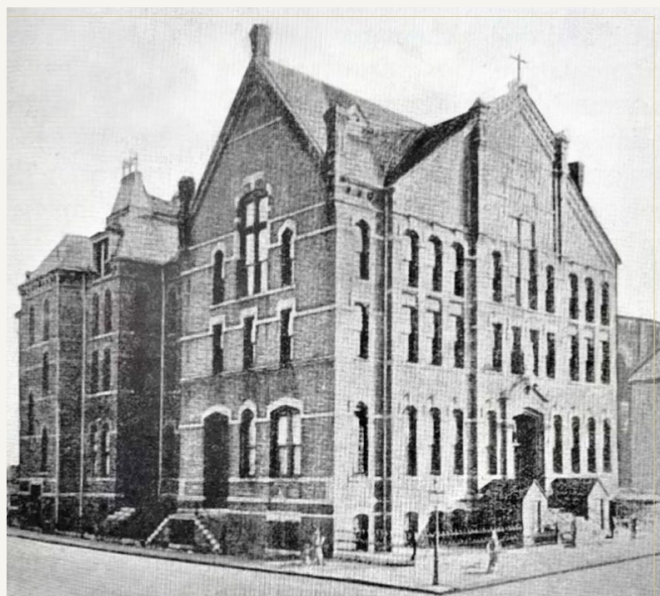
The cornerstone of the building told its own story. Inside was a time capsule that included newspapers, school catalogs, coins and photographs of Pope Leo XIII and Bishop Foley. The capsule included a document featuring the building's contract in Latin, the seal of St. Ignatius College and the names of the President of the United States, Governor of Illinois, Mayor of Chicago and President of St. Ignatius College. This document is preserved today in the Saint Ignatius College Prep Archives.

Sodality Hall was proposed by the fourth President of St. Ignatius College, Thomas H. Miles, S.J. He enlisted the help of architect Gregoire Vigeant, a French Canadian who made Chicago his home and designed Notre Dame de Chicago and the United Church of Hyde Park. Vigeant chose a Romanesque Revival architectural style for Sodality Hall which, paired with the Gothic notes of Holy Family and the French Second Empire influence of St. Ignatius College. It created a truly unique blend of European architectural styles along Chicago's Jesuit corridor.

The sodalities across the Jesuit campus were a crucial component in fulfilling the Jesuit mission of learning and service. Groups like the Married Men's Sodality, Young Lady's Sodality and the Sodality of St. Ignatius College had a home at Sodality Hall. These organizations ran community libraries, hosted night school classes and lectures, raised funds for the church, donated religious art and statues and organized outreach to Chicago's poor. The sodalities helped promote culture and camaraderie across the community and organized baseball teams, choirs, bands and theater groups.

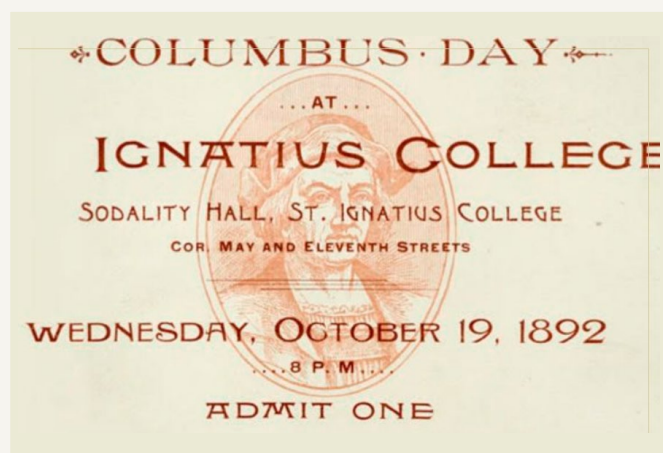


Sodalita Hall exterior. *Saint Ignatius College Prep Archives*

Few photos exist of the interior of Sodalita Hall and the original plans of the building have not been recovered. However, many alumni of Holy Family School, which resided in Sodalita Hall from 1933 to 1960, remember fondly the beauty of the building.

"When you walked into Sodalita Hall you immediately recognized that the space was sacred," shared Fr. Steven Giovangelo, who attended grammar school in the building in the late 1950s. "The Sacred Heart and the Virgin Mary were depicted all over," he recalled. "There were life-size statues of each in the entrance and photographs of them in every room." Sodalita's chapel featured stained glass windows and woodworking likely from Sebastian Buscher, who'd carved the wood statues in Holy Family.

The various offices, libraries and reading rooms were adorned with chandeliers and ornately carved bookshelves. "I remember the principal's office was all books, head to toe," Fr. Giovangelo

told me. "There was a wrought iron wraparound staircase that went up to the second floor of books. It felt like something out of *Harry Potter*."

Sodalita Hall was the birthplace of the Catholic Order of Foresters in 1883, a national fraternal organization now headquartered in Naperville. St. Ignatius College frequently used Sodalita Hall as a space for special events for community and learning. St. Ignatius hosted lectures from visitors, concerts, theatrical performances and oratorical competitions in the building. The rich tradition of Jesuit science flourished at Sodalita Hall, with scientific demonstrations and lectures from the school's Students Scientific Circle frequently hosted there.

Sodalita Hall allowed St. Ignatius College to adapt to the changing historical circumstances of the twentieth century. During World War I, Loyola University's temporary ROTC troop was established and headquartered in Sodalita Hall. The building helped prepare American troops for service in Europe and gave the school the opportunity to serve its country. In the 1920s, increased enrollment forced branches of St. Ignatius College to temporarily relocate to Sodalita Hall. Many older parishioners like Fr. Giovangelo remember Sodalita Hall as the building that housed Holy Family School from 1933 to 1960.

Sodalita Hall was, at its core, a space where the church and school community went to thrive. With sports, service, performances and prayer, the building truly lived up to its name and enabled community at Church of the Holy Family and St. Ignatius College for eighty-eight years.

The building came down in 1960, but its spirit survives to this day. The project that began in 1878 and shaped so many lives will inform the future as we develop our vision for the new Sodalita Hall. The proposed spaces include music rooms, science classrooms, performing arts venues and reception halls – all spaces where today's Wolfpack will live, learn, find community and prosper.
