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# MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Dear Members of the Saint Ignatius Family,

“No kid can’t come” was a favorite saying of one of our former Presidents, Rev. Donald Rowe, S.J. While our English teachers would cringe at the grammar and double negative, it was Father’s way of calling attention to a cornerstone of our Mission.

Since our founding by Rev. Arnold Damen, S.J. the school has always made sure that academically qualified young women and men would be admitted without regard to family resources and ability to pay. Our feature article reflects on the way that you, our partners, provide the resources to our students and families. For centuries, the cost of running Catholic schools was shouldered by the Congregations of religious men and women who founded and staffed them. The Society of Jesus is amongst the most prolific.

As you read through the article, you will understand the financial challenge for middle-class families – caught between ever-rising costs for Catholic education and their commitment to a faith-based Catholic education for their children. Our school has always generously addressed the needs of the economically marginalized. Now it is time for us to increase assistance to those families in the middle class. Many of these parents work two jobs. They make wise economic decisions in their budgeting. They choose to live a moderate lifestyle. Unlike other states where families have access to tuition vouchers and other resources, our families do not have that opportunity. The support for financial aid for endowment gifting is a critical way in which you can support our students and ensure that our school’s composition is not a barbell … those who have little and those who are self-sufficient, with no folks in the middle. Please accept my thanks in advance for your discernment about ways you can help.

The campus and our community have been active the first semester and into the next. As you read through this magazine you will be filled with pride about the many accomplishments of our students, faculty and coaches. Moreover, you will see that Catholic and Jesuit remains centered in our formation process. Seven hundred seventy 8th graders tested in December for the three hundred fifty seats we have available for the Class of 2028. It was a very talented pool of young people.

When you are in the neighborhood, stop in and say hello. We would like you to be able to walk through the latest addition to campus—the strength and conditioning and wrestling spaces in the 1055 W. Roosevelt building.

While it seems like Christmas was just yesterday, we have begun to prepare for the coming of Lent. You are invited to join us for the distribution of ashes and our Ash Wednesday Mass in Church of the Holy Family during the 8:20 a.m. Mass or before school. 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# Doing More Than What Is Expected

Making Jesuit Catholic Education Accessible



**S**ince the founding of their very first schools, the Society of Jesus has always stayed committed to ensuring these places of education remained accessible to all students. In a 1980 document entitled *Our Secondary Schools: Today and Tomorrow*, then Superior, General Pedro Arrupe, wrote:

“We are committed to educate any class of person, without distinction. It cannot be otherwise, because the educational apostolate (just as every other apostolate of the Society) bears the indelible Ignatian imprint of universality because the secondary schools of the Society are necessarily instruments of the apostolate—and are therefore subject

in principle to the radical gratuity of our ministries, and to our poverty—their availability to students cannot be conditioned by ability to pay. This statement of principle is our ideal.”

Nearly six centuries ago, Saint Ignatius of Loyola challenged all of those who followed him to lead a life of service

to others. The spirituality and values of Saint Ignatius of Loyola and the early Jesuits marked the schools they founded. Paramount among those values is the commitment to be “Contemplatives in action.” This means to lead a life of service to others and to act always for the greater glory of God.

The ideal of school access to students of all economic classes is a virtuous goal, but it can be difficult to achieve because the cost of education has dramatically increased over the decades. Some of the reasons for this include the decline of religious staff and the crucial need to provide talented lay teachers and staff a just wage. In addition, expenses have been driven up by the demand for high-quality facilities and the need to invest in school technology and security amongst other factors. However, more affluent schools cannot become selective gated communities for the elite, driving people apart instead of bringing them closer. These schools must find ways to be open to the middle-class regardless of their ability to pay.

Saint Ignatius is able to provide access to an exceptional Jesuit Catholic education to all talented students without regard to a student’s financial resources. This is due to the generosity of our alumni, parents, friends and benefactors. This generosity comes in many forms: Through the Annual Fund for Tuition Assistance, the Parent Commitment, Capital Gifts for construction, Estate Gifts and through Endowments.

Endowments are essential to our long-term commitment to provide access to Saint Ignatius to all talented young men and women. Endowments provide us permanent capital which we prudently invest. This creates a perpetual income stream for generations. Endowment donors choose the area of need dearest to them to support, such as: Tuition

Assistance, Faculty Excellence, Arts and Athletics, Scholastic Programs and many more. They often honor the memory of a family member, mentor or loved one with their gift.

Saint Ignatius is extremely grateful to the Haberkorn family who recently helped create *The Haberkorn Family Endowment Fund in Support of the Children of Chicago Fire Fighters & Police Officers*. The family wished to provide tuition assistance to families like this and to honor their father, John, who served Chicago as a firefighter, and their brother Jack, who served in the Chicago Police Department and later as Chief of Police in Oak Lawn. They were their heroes. Their father was a very modest and humble man who rarely talked about his illustrious career even as he rose to the Department’s highest rank—Chief Fire Marshall. They witnessed the sacrifices their parents made in order to send his twin brothers Joe ’49 and Ed ’49 and Jim ’52 to Saint Ignatius, and there has always been a



strong desire to help families like these, to also send their children to Saint Ignatius. In addition to his father and brother, many members of the Haberkorn extended family have served Chicago through our Fire and Police Departments.

Jim ’52 considers his Saint Ignatius education and experience central to his being. “Everything I became in life, I owe to Saint Ignatius.” He recalled his only JUG, a severe one. He arrived to school one day less than 5 minutes late after commuting from the south side during a bad winter snow storm. Fr. Mangold, S.J. was at the top of the stairs as he arrived and delivered the sentence: 10 mornings of early JUG. After his mother protested that she was serving JUG as well, the sentence was

altered to 20 days of after school JUG. "I learned a lesson and am grateful for it," he said.

Saint Ignatius College Prep was founded in 1869, with the mission to educate young men to be faithful followers of God, servants to others, scholars and life-long learners. Chicago has changed dramatically since 1869 but one constant has been the presence of Saint Ignatius on the west side. Immigrant and first-generation neighborhood boys from nations all over Europe first attended Saint Ignatius. When these students entered the magnificent school on 12th street from their modest apartments, they knew their lives would be changed forever. Since that time, immigrants from every continent settled in Chicago and their children have been welcomed and educated at Saint Ignatius. Along with Rev. Damen's first mission, the Church of the Holy Family, Saint Ignatius has withstood fires, plagues, political tumult, stock market crashes and World Wars to remain a shining example of the importance of a Jesuit Catholic education to a city, country and our world.

It has been central to the mission of Saint Ignatius to offer admittance to all young men and women with the talent and desire to study in the Jesuit tradition, regardless of their financial resources.

Throughout the history of Saint Ignatius College Prep, children of Chicago Firefighters and Chicago Police Officers comprised a meaningful number of the enrollment. Tuition was considerably lower as Jesuits and scholastics did nearly all the teaching. Students often worked after school and throughout the summer

to help with the tuition payments. Financial aid was always available. In recent decades with the support from generous alumni and benefactors, financial aid has grown considerably. Saint Ignatius now provides more than \$6.5 million annually in need-based tuition assistance. Despite this, fewer of the children of these critically important public servants are attending Saint Ignatius. It has become very difficult for middle-class families to add Saint Ignatius tuition payments to the family budget.

*The Haberkorn Family Endowment Fund in Support of the Children of Chicago Fire Fighters & Police Officers* will provide financial assistance to students whose parent or parents serve and protect the residents of Chicago. We are grateful to the Haberkorn family and the many others who work to pay forward all the blessings and benefits they have received in their lives.

Your support will honor the history of a school founded on the values of faith and service to others. The Haberkorn Family Endowment will ensure that students whose parents lead a life of service will be able to receive the life-long gift of a Jesuit Catholic education for generations to come. Saint Ignatius College Prep encourages more support for this group and hopes that many alumni, who themselves are children of CFD and CPD, will consider donating to the Haberkorn Family Endowment or by starting their own family endowments.

Haberkorn '52 is fond of saying, "I've never had a bad day, as long as I wake up in the morning." Another favorite is, "Always try to do more than what's expected of you." He knows he learned both of these lessons from his father and family: Be grateful for what you

# Wolfpack Composer Heads to National Conference

**D**uring the isolation of Covid, one Saint Ignatius College Prep student took the time to pick up a passion that is propelling him on his path. "I got into piano during the pandemic. I'd bang around on it," said Tyler Shaver '24, "I play a classical instrument, but I push it to make different sounds."

Those sounds are getting attention. A piece he wrote called "Sitting on a City Park Bench at Night," got the spotlight at National YoungArts Week in Miami, Florida. Shaver attended the conference as a YoungArts Award with Distinction winner in the classical music/composition category.

Through composition, Shaver has worked to create his own unique voice. He said, "What inspires me for art is conceptual and abstract. I like to start with an argument or idea. For instance, in "Sitting", it was an argument against people viewing music as inherently natural...In the piece I had music imitate the sounds of car horns and jackhammers to show that music is just as artificial as it is natural."

Shaver's goal with music is to give the listener a concept and challenge an idea that listener might have. When he goes to college next fall, he'll be majoring in music composition and philosophy – a purposeful choice.

"Philosophy Club has helped me explore how people think and approach the world, which has allowed me to do that with my music," said Shaver.

His Saint Ignatius College Prep Fine Arts teachers are proud of their student's prodigious growth.



Ms. Mary Ellen Schneider said, "For someone to know how to compose in high school is unbelievable. Tyler is writing lofty music for someone his age. It's exciting because he's connecting the dots with all his music study. It's really inspiring."

Mr. Jason Steffen added, "Usually students don't complete the compositions Tyler's doing until college and beyond. The music he selects - that avant garde style - is important."

And the student's commitment to that style is even stronger now. Shaver, who met with other composers at the conference, says his time at National YoungArts Week "solidified my decision to major in music composition and showed me the possibilities for my network going forward."

Shaver is taking his momentum to Northwestern University where he'll continue his music studies. As the Wolfpack member prepares to become a Wildcat, he said with a smile of accomplishment, "Northwestern has one of the most boundary-pushing music schools in the country."

# Archivist Recording Oral Histories

**A**uthor Hemann Hesse said, "Without words, without writing and without books there would be no history."

Here at Saint Ignatius College Prep, we value the people who have shaped our 155 years. That's why we document events in many ways: Through the collection of artifacts, through the written word and, now, through oral histories.

Archivist Angela Perine has begun to record conversations with alumni to preserve important aspects of the Wolfpack's past. She conducted her first oral history interviews at the end of 2023 with members of the 1965 Saint Ignatius Cross Country team, which was applying for Hall of Fame designation at the time.

"Our conversation was about much more than their winning ways," said Perine. "It was about how they built lifelong relationships. Many of them are still in touch."

In a phone interview from his location in Utah, which Perine recorded, Bill Stevens '65 talked about everything from his coaches to training for the cross country team.

Stevens said, "Our practices were a mix of distance work and speed work – 200 yard sprints, 200 yards of easy jogging, followed by sprints again. No cross training. No calisthenics. No weight training. Just run, run, run!"

He also talked about balancing sports and studies – something our students today certainly understand.

"Managing class work wasn't easy. I was in the top tier...I'm very competitive and took school work seriously," recalled Stevens, "Not getting home 'til 6:00 p.m and being the oldest of 12 – it was a full schedule. I had to hold my own in a very smart class. There was not much leisure time. I'd get home, eat what was left of dinner and have three hours of homework. I had no time for anything else," he chuckled, "This was way before video games."

While much of the conversation revolved around sports and life in general at Saint Ignatius College Prep, it also painted a picture of the world in the 1960s. The result is an audible time capsule for anyone interested in the history of that period.

Perine reflected on the interviews she conducted with Stevens and his surviving teammates.

"It was a really impactful point in their lives," she said, "One of the team members talked about having been afraid during the Cuban Missile Crisis, and how relying on the camaraderie of his teammates at a tough time was really helpful."

Perine knows how important it is to take the time to record history for posterity. She also knows time is of the essence.

"People on the team have already passed away," said Perine, "But for the people who we spoke with, we have their history recorded for future generations. Those generations will be able to hear their stories."

SIMUN Program Director Diane Haleas said, "The leaders organized this with unmatched passion and dedication. They have a real love for all the people who came here today, and they wanted to give them a positive experience in the interest of making positive changes in the world."

# Merci, Former French President Hollande!

A person who's had a place on the world stage, took to our own stage at the McLaughlin Theater. Saint Ignatius College Prep hosted former French President François Hollande, who served the people of France from 2012 to 2017.

Members of the Saint Ignatius Language Department had the opportunity to share a table with Hollande as he answered questions from students and staff. They also translated for the full auditorium when he did not speak English. To that end, Hollande said "French has a richness that gets lost in English translation. French is necessary for universal culture." Hollande encouraged the French students who were there, to continue to learn the language.

The 24th President of France also talked about how life after leading his country is taking shape.

"After my presidential term, I wanted to support our youth, particularly youth and social justice," said Hollande, who works to fundraise and support projects in that space. He spoke about his recent book, *Bouleversements* and delved into politics.

Hollande told the crowd he believes that the world's young people are the individuals responsible for fighting for democracy. He said he became a politician in the first place because of the inspiration around him when he was young.

In responding to questions, Hollande shared lessons from his presidency. "I learned you have to work for the best, but you have to be ready to handle the worst," reflected Hollande. He talked about the need to be proactive – another presidential lesson. He framed his comments around current global events and issues such as the war in Ukraine, climate change and relations with Russia and China.

One of the final questions the global leader answered was about faith. He said the separation between Church and State is necessary, but that faith is important in democracy. "It teaches us how to live together and respect each other," said Hollande.

After all the talk time, Hollande took personal time with students and teachers to sign books, share short stories and take pictures.

"The French department is grateful for the opportunity to engage with our language of study in a real world context," said French teacher, Kellye Guzik, "This was an unforgettable experience that students will remember for a lifetime."

# Meeting the Social and Emotional Needs of Students

"I am very excited about this opportunity to normalize talking about mental health, caring for yourself and caring for others," said Prefect of Studies Dr. Sterling Brown. His time at other Jesuit high schools taught Brown that a licensed therapist can make a considerable difference on campus. He's a big believer in showing students there's "nothing wrong with having a conversation with a pro who can help you process what life has in front of you."

In today's world, what life puts in front of our young people can be very complex. Social media, pressures to succeed, societal expectations and family challenges are among the things that can put mental health at risk, spurring a need to talk at a time when finding resources off campus is tough.

So when Brown came to Saint Ignatius College Prep, he spoke with students and others about meeting the social and emotional needs of our freshman, sophomores, juniors and seniors. You see the result of a year's worth of conversations, with Stephanie Brennan, LCPC, who began her work with the Pack this past fall.

Brennan, a licensed therapist said, "Helping students socially and emotionally is a huge part of their development. The fact that Saint Ignatius is looking at this for students, shows it's a culture that advocates for their needs."

Beyond that, Brennan says she loves working with teenagers. You'll find her here, at 1076 West Roosevelt Road, serving our young people on campus two days a week. The students she sees come to her on a referral basis from their school counselors.


"Her addition shows we listen to and are there for our kids in more ways than a test score," said Brown. He's glad Saint Ignatius College Prep can be part of a conversation that normalizes mental health and wellness in the pursuit of caring for the whole person.

"Therapy is an act of strength," said Brown, "Being willing to have these conversations, and being part of an organization that recognizes their value is an act of strength."

The gym buzzes with energy as the wrestling team gears up for practice. The athletes warm up, stretch their muscles and prepare themselves for the physical and mental challenges that lie ahead. The team members break into pairs and begin their drills. Sweat drips onto the mat, making their commitment and dedication to the sport evident. Coaches move around, offering guidance, instruction and motivation. But for the first time in Saint Ignatius College Prep history, the male-dominated sport looks much different. That's because these wrestlers are young women.

Saint Ignatius started the girls team this school year – which is “on trend” as women’s wrestling is the fastest-growing female sport in the United States. Head Coach Benjamin Sanchez launched the program because of the growing popularity and the interest among female students.

# Welcoming Women to Saint Ignatius Wrestling

Coach Sanchez said, “There are girls out there who can do it and want to do it, and I’m here to support it.”

Giancarla Garduño ‘27, or “GG,” is a member of the girls wrestling team. She discovered wrestling as a junior high school student two years ago when her friend convinced her to give it a try. The girls registered for a program with Beat the Streets Chicago, an organization that empowers local youth through wrestling. Turns out, it created a pathway in more ways than one.

Saint Ignatius College Prep donates gym space to Beat the Streets Chicago, which is how Garduño met Coach Sanchez and first learned about Saint Ignatius.

“This is a great kid. She needs a chance at a school like this. We want her to have all the means to succeed,” said Coach Sanchez.

Garduño is loving the connections she’s made because of wrestling. She says being part of the sport not only helped her find her way to Saint Ignatius, it’s helped her grow her school friendships. Catalina Flores ‘26 is part of Garduño’s friend circle. They met when Garduño visited Saint Ignatius on a shadow day for prospective students. Ever since, Flores has been a real mentor to Garduño and has helped her navigate school.

Flores brings her own story to wrestling at Saint Ignatius. She says her father

influenced her to pursue sports. She thought about giving soccer a try, but it wasn’t for her. Growing up, she would watch boxing and mixed martial arts (MMA), which inspired her to pursue wrestling.

Flores is a prime example of how the girls wrestling team is providing opportunities for female athletes that wouldn’t have existed otherwise. It’s breaking down gender stereotypes and encouraging girls to pursue their athletic interests.

The paths the wrestlers are forging come with goals. Garduño has made it her mission to qualify for the Illinois High School State Wrestling Tournament, and she has dreams of one day earning an athletic scholarship to college. Those kinds of opportunities are becoming more plentiful with many colleges starting women’s wrestling programs. Athletes who build their skills in high school eventually will populate those programs.

Speaking of high school athletes, the young women on the Saint Ignatius Wrestling team want to see the sport they love, grow. Right now, there are four wrestlers in the Wolfpack’s female ranks, but through word-of-mouth and the partnership with Beat the Streets Chicago, Coach Sanchez believes those numbers will rapidly increase.

“It’s so exciting. I just think that it’s going to eventually surpass men’s wrestling. I really truly believe that,” said Coach Sanchez.

## GIRLS VOLLEYBALL

Girls Volleyball concluded a historic season with a 3rd Place victory over Morton at the IHSA 3A State Series in Bloomington, IL, its highest finish in program history. The Wolfpack finished the year with a 26-10 record, with IHSA Super Sectional, Sectional and Regional championships on the season. 
## FOOTBALL


## BOYS GOLF






# Donor Profile

## MALIK MURRAY '92

Saint Ignatius College Prep recently sat down with Malik Murray '92 to talk about his connections to Saint Ignatius and why he feels it's important to support our school.



### WHAT IS YOUR CONNECTION TO SAINT IGNATIUS?

My introduction to the school started in the "Classifieds." Literally! As an aspiring young hoopster, my father learned about the summer basketball camps hosted by the school to help recruit student-athletes to join the Wolfpack. I went to the camp the summer before seventh grade not knowing a single person, a daunting experience coming from the south side of Chicago. The gift was meeting kids from neighborhoods across Chicago, many of whom I am still close to today. The game of basketball is unique in that it has a way of unifying people, and I remain grateful that athletics introduced me to one of the best academic institutions in the world.

I was fortunate to be a part of the Class of 1992. To this day I humbly remark that giving me the privilege to walk the halls of 1076 was the best investment my parents ever made. In 1992 I was a member of the first boys basketball team to win a Regional Championship in twenty years. I was also fortunate to be named to the Chicago All-Area Team that same year. In addition to being recognized as the *Chicago Sun-Times* Player of the Week three times during my senior year, I was awarded the Chicago Catholic League Player of the Year at the conclusion of the season as well. That award wouldn't have been possible without the recognition and respect our team earned during the 1991-1992 season. The culmination of this hard work resulted in a four-year athletic scholarship to play basketball at De Paul University for then Head Coach Joey Meyer.

One of the gifts of Saint Ignatius College Prep is how it stresses the importance of hard work and excellence very early -- two essential ingredients necessary to achieve success. I remain grateful for my teachers and coaches who insisted on both the first day I stepped on campus.

### WHAT IS YOUR PROFESSIONAL BACKGROUND?

For the past 19 years, I have been fortunate to be one of one hundred and thirty teammates committed to serving the client base amassed over the past forty years at Ariel Investments. It is the first Black-owned investment firm in the world with \$14 Billion in assets under management led by Chairman, Founder and Co-CEO John W. Rogers, Jr. and fellow Saint Ignatius College Prep alum, President and Co-CEO Mellody Hobson '87.

After graduating from DePaul with and B.S. in Finance in 1996, I started my professional career at First Chicago Futures, ultimately becoming lead broker for the Exchange Traded Products Group. The bank went through a series of mergers and ultimately became JPMorgan. While at the bank I went back to De Paul to pursue my MBA in Finance ('04). I jokingly tell people that I enjoyed my time in Lincoln Park so much that I decided to "pay for it" the second time around.

Starting as a young "Padawan" professionally at Ariel in 2004 and holding a variety of roles since then, I now have a leadership role, sitting in the seat of Head of Business Development. Some of the most important lessons I have learned at Ariel include the importance of being a great corporate citizen, civic responsibility and philanthropy. This was further entrenched during my experience in the Leadership of Greater Chicago program (2014 Fellow). I currently serve on the Board of Trustees of DePaul University, holding the distinction of being the first Men's Basketball player in the school's history to serve on the board. I was also recently asked to assume the role of Vice Chair of the Athletics committee. I am on the board of the National Association of Securities Professionals, serving on the Executive team as Co-Chair of the Legislative Committee. Finally, I recently concluded my second term on the board of trustees at Saint Ignatius College Prep, serving on the Executive Committee as Chair of the Diversity, Equity, Inclusion and Belonging Committee.

## WHY DID YOU WANT TO DONATE TO SAINT IGNATIUS?

Two years ago, at the Tolton Society Summer Soiree, I announced the establishment of the Linda Diane Murray Excellence through Education, Diversity and Inclusion Endowment. This was done to support Chicago's future leaders who wish to continue their educational journey at Saint Ignatius College Prep. In the words of Olympic Gold Medalist Jackie Joyner-Kersee, "That which you share will multiply." The ripple effect of investing in young people across the entire city can yield infinite dividends. As someone keen on investing, I know this is money well spent.

## WHY WOULD YOU ENCOURAGE OTHERS TO DONATE?

While the importance of philanthropy is generally understood, the act of being an active participant when it comes to giving back continues to evolve. This is particularly true in instances where resources are limited. More education is needed, not only on the importance of giving back but also on ways you can contribute, such as volunteering. ## FROM THE ARCHIVES

# Rev. Sloan T. Letman III J.D., '65 and The Chicago Defender

**T**he *Chicago Defender* was among the most prominent African American newspapers in the 20th century. Founded in 1905 by Robert S. Abbott, *The Chicago Defender* was the first newspaper published by African Americans with a readership of more than 100,000. Among the well-known writers for the paper were Ida B. Wells, Langston Hughes and Walter Francis White.

Saint Ignatius College Prep's very own Rev. Sloan T. Letman III J.D., '65 (1947-2014), was another contributor to *The Chicago Defender*. Rev. Sloan wrote for *The Chicago Defender* from 1963-1964. He was editor of the Chess Notes column, which provided an overview of the game's fundamentals. Rev. Sloan's participation in Rev. Edwin Moosbrugger's Chess Club served as the inspiration for this column. In fact, the Saint Ignatius College Prep Chess Club was featured in a November 1963 article. Other intersections between Saint Ignatius College Prep and *The Chicago Defender* include a feature on a Robert J. Kramer, '65 poem titled, "The Statue of Liberty."

Rev. Sloan interviewed musicians King Fleming and Lurlean Hunter, Chicago playwright Aurelia Gaither, and disc jockey Andre Zanatta of WSBC-FM for The Most column. He also regularly contributed to the TEENS: point of view column, where he wrote about career paths for recent high school graduates, civil rights, history and philosophy.
